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

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PREFACE

EW ARTISTS, whose work has appeared in book form, have received more attention from collectors and less from bibliographers than has Arthur Rackham. One can scarcely pick up a general catalogue of a rare-book dealer without finding at least one of Rackham's books, yet there is no comprehensive list of his published work, and it is safe to say that many ardent collectors are unaware of many of his early books and magazine illustrations.

As is often the case in book-collecting, the most elusive and perplexing items are not those of greatest importance in the artist's production, but rather the early pieces lightly considered by author and public when they appeared and soon forgotten as more significant work was published. However the critic may regard these first efforts, they are dear to the heart of the collector, and perhaps not unimportant to the student of the more mature productions.

This attempt to record all of Rackham's published work has been complicated because of the fact that his earliest drawings appeared in several magazines, some of which are not easily found. Mr. Rackham has informed the authors that his first appearance in print was in the Magazine Scraps in 1884. Thereafter he contributed to Pall Mall and Westminster Budgets, The Daily Graphic, Illustrated Bits, Cassell's, and other periodicals. Some of these have not been accessible to the authors, but it is hoped that the appearance of this list will bring forth this

and other data necessary to complete the record of Rack-ham's published work.

Many of the magazine illustrations that appeared from 1896 to 1907 were subsequently published in book form, often in editions which contained the work of other illustrators as well. Others, however, have never been reprinted, and these have special interest to the collector. Rackham's first work achieved the dignity of publication in book form in 1893 in a modest little volume, now probably the rarest of all his books, To The Other Side. This was nothing more than a guide book designed to encourage travel to Canada and the United States. It was sold in paper wrappers at one shilling and in cloth binding at two shillings, and was distributed by railway and steamship companies. The illustrations were mostly drawings from photographs. It is a far cry from this work to the fine illustrations in Grimm's Fairy Tales that appeared seven years later and marked the advent of a new master among book illustrators.

Until that time his work had been considered incidental to the text; since then it has been sought after because of its own merit by an ever-widening circle of collectors. Rip Van Winkle, published in 1905, was his first book in a limited signed edition; from then on to the present date most of his books have been published in both limited and trade editions. The list of Rackham's books is an imposing array of classic tales and contemporary writings to each of which he has imparted fresh or added interest through his imaginative interpretation of the text.

The authors of this bibliography have encountered numerous difficulties in collecting data on some of the volumes, particularly the earlier ones. In many instances there were two and sometimes even three or four different bindings on books apparently of the same edition. The first issues were usually in more elaborate bindings, having gold stamping and lettering and with gilt edges, while later issues often had blind stamping and the lettering in black or color. In the earlier books it is often necessary to distinguish first issues by the clearness of the illustrations, which often show signs of wear in later editions.


Information has been obtained mostly from the authors' own collections, with the help of Mr. Rackham and his publishers; often the opinions cited have been deduced from a comparison of copies, as for example, when dated advertisements occur in the books. In cases of simultaneous publication in England, America, and on the continent, the English edition has been considered the true first.

Bibliographical details have been minimized in this list. Since the point of interest is in the illustrations rather than in the text; and since these seldom undergo change after production has started, it has not seemed necessary to go into as much detail as one would for literary first editions. In submitting this list to other Rackham enthusiasts, the authors are aware that they are amateur bibliographers but they believe they have incorporated the essentials. Their chief desire is to make possible for others the pleasure they have had in rounding out their

collections and in finding delightful and unsuspected work by Arthur Rackham hidden in magazine files and little known books.

ARTHUR RACKHAM

BRIEF SKETCH OF ARTHUR RACKHAM

RTHUR RACKHAM was born in London, September 19, 1867. His father, a British Admiralty Marshal, very early decided upon a business career for his son. However, Arthur Rackham could see nothing congruous between business and drawing, and the holidays found him walking the beautiful pathways of rural England with his paint box and brushes.

Business occupied his hours during the day, but he found time to attend the Lambeth School of Art in the evenings, and in due time reached a state of artistic excellence that permitted him to devote his entire time

to illustrating.

Through the years, Arthur Rackham's work has grown steadily in the world's favor, and today there probably is no other illustrator whose work is collected with such appreciation and enthusiasm.

In imagination, draftsmanship and colour-blending, his work stands alone. His deep understanding of the spirit of myth, fable and folk-lore affords him a trans-

cendent range of expression.


From Wagner's The Ring to Mother Goose, Mr. Rackham's skilled brush leaves an exquisite spectrum of the mystical, the rhymthic, the humorous, and the wholesomely-joyful. His animal studies and landscapes are genuinely pulsating with life, colour and joy.

Mr. Rackham is a member of The Royal Society of Painters in Water-Colours, an associate member of The Societe Nationale de Beaux Arts, Paris, and a Master of the Art Worker's Guild. He won gold medals at Milan, in 1906; Venice, in 1909; and in Barcelona, in 1910. There are permanent exhibits of his work in Vienna, Barcelona, Melbourne, Preston, Bradford, The Luxembourg in Paris, and the Tate Gallery in London. In 1933 he exhibited a portrait of his daughter at the Royal Society of Portrait Painters, and in 1935 did the designs for the Opera, Hansel and Gretel.

In a recent letter to the authors, Mr. Rackham said, "I am looking forward to the bibliography-and you must insert some blank leaves at the end, for I don't

mean to stop work yet awhile."

Bound in pictorial wrappers in colour with a globe in the center, the American flag in the upper left-hand corner, and a ship in the lower left-hand corner. 106 numbered pages, 8½x10¾. There is also another edition bound in brown cloth with the same pictorial wrapper pasted on the cover. This is a travel book and is illustrated with drawings in black and white by Arthur Rackham, mostly done from photographs. This is the first book that Mr. Rackham illustrated; all his previous work had appeared in magazines and other periodicals. The wrapper edition was published in March, 1893, and sold for one shilling; the cloth edition was published at the same time, and sold for two shillings.

Bound in light yellow or red wrappers with a picture of "Dolly" on the cover. The yellow cover has the picture of "Dolly," and the lettering is in blue; the lettering on the spine is in blue also. The red wrapper has the picture of "Dolly," and the lettering is in black. 111 numbered pages, 5½x7. The first issue of the wrapper edition has the short running headline throughout the book, "Dolly," while the later issues have the

full title, "The Dolly Dialogues." The later issues of the wrapper edition have the notice of reprint in the upper left-hand corner of the cover. The wrapper edition was published in July, 1894. There are four full-page illustrations in black and white halftones. This story originally appeared in *The Westminster Gazette* and was not illustrated until published in book form.

The cloth edition is bound in blue cloth with the same design on the cover as is on the wrapper edition. The picture of "Dolly" and the lettering are in brown. 111 numbered pages, 5½ x7. The illustrations are the same, except that one illustration is used as a frontispiece, whereas in the wrapper edition the four illustrations are included in the various chapters. The endpapers of the first issue are tan with a design of peacock feathers, while the later issues have plain end-papers. As the blue cloth edition has both the pictorial end-papers and one illustration used as a frontispiece, and as the illustrations are much clearer than in the other cloth editions, we feel fairly certain that this is the real first issue of the cloth edition. Both cloth editions have the same date, 1894; it is therefore difficult to identify the first issue except for the above reasons. The other cloth edition is bound in tan cloth with the same design on the cover in brown and brown lettering. The wrapper edition was published in July at one shilling, and the cloth edition in August at two shillings and six pence.

Forty-nine drawings in black and white by Arthur Rackham. The first issue has the Great Eastern Railway advertisement at the back of the book, dated 1894. This seems to be the only way of distinguishing the first issue, as none of the editions was dated on the title page. The later issues have the later dates on the advertisement. The wrapper edition was published at six pence, and the cloth edition at one shilling. They were both published at the same time, 1894.

There is a cheaper edition of this book published at the same time as the cloth edition (1894), bound in glazed white pictorial boards with an entirely different design on the cover. This edition has the picture of a man sitting on a rock by the sea; the back cover has an advertisement for Mason's Extract of Herbs, and the spine is lettered length-wise instead of cross-wise. Both editions have the same number of illustrations, the same title page, and the same date, 1894.

There are two bindings of this book, one in green cloth and one in blue cloth. Both have the same date on the title page, the same gold pictorial stamping on the cover, and the same gold lettering on the spine. Neither binding has any lettering on the cover, and both have the gilt top. There are 190 numbered pages, and 18 pages of advertisements at the back of the book. The first issue has at the beginning, "A Selected List of Cassell & Company's Publications." "6G-10.97" at the bottom of the page in the right-hand corner. The size of the page is $5\frac{1}{4}$ x7%. There are four full-page illustrations in colour and nineteen drawings in black and white, which illustrations first appeared in magazine form in Little Folks Magazine, in 1896. This book was published in October, 1897.

There is also a reprint of this book published in 1904, under the title *The Surprising Adventures of Tuppy and Tue*. This edition is bound in light blue cloth with the same pictorial stamping (in red) on the cover and gold lettering on the spine. Published by the same publishers.

The first edition has the title page in black lettering and has "Illustrated by Arthur Rackham," and no mention of the number of illustrations; but there are eight full-page plates in colour. The illustrations in this edition have the number of the page that they illustrate in the lower right-hand corner, and these illustrations are much clearer and the colours better than in any of the other editions. 

THE only honest excuse I can offer for daring to ask your attention for a lawless composition of this kind is the near approach of the Chicago Exhibition. You, it is understood, being unacquainted with transatlantic travel. Allow me to explain.


You may or may not be aware that comparatively few Englishmen visit the Other Side. That is to say, the great bulk of the names appearing in the passenger lists of the Atlantic liners are those of American citizens and their "belongings." There are, no doubt, more

reasons why an American should visit England than an Englishman America, yet even when the respective forces of attraction are allowed for, the numbers are altogether out of proportion. In my opinion the reason of this is that the majority of people among us have exaggerated ideas of what a trip to the Other Side means. And if my view is at all correct, there will probably be many persons who, without sufficient substantial reason, will be deterred from going to see certainly the most wonderful "Fair" the world has ever had got together for its instruction and amusement. You remember that the author of the book of travel says, in so many words, that the more shamelessly egotistical a writer is the truer the notion of the realities of travel

It is calculated that the American element represents eighty per cent. of the entire traffic, the remaining twenty per cent. being largely made up of other not-Englishmen.



STREET SCENE IN CHINA TOWN, SAN FRANCISCO. From a Photograph by Tuber, San Francisco.

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
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
