It became so bad that Captain Tambs was forced to throw out three anchors to keep his timy craft from dashing to pieces on the rocks. He said that even with the help of the anchors, the boat kept dragging, and for a time he had visions of his trip being ended.

They then proceeded to Spain and Carhana and thence to Lisben where the boat kes put in for repairs. "Teddy" had broken the main boom and most of the rigging had to be gone over to make her seaworthy once more. From Lisben they "wrocceded to Madeira, and then to the 'nary Islands where they made a stop of fells months. It was there that the Sec-
