Bryan in his memoirs said that he did not agree with the President in purpose but admired Wilson for his clearness of thoughts and diction. Few men in America have been as colorful in their speech as Bryan - few men in Bryan's position would seek correction from another with whom they were at variance in purposes. Bryan accepted the man at his true worth - he showed fairmindadness.


